Notes to Financial Statements

A. ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

<u>Organization:</u> Bob Woodruff Family Foundation, Inc. (BWF), d/b/a Bob Woodruff Foundation, was incorporated in September 2007 under the state of New York as a not-for-profit corporation. BWF provides resources and support to injured service members, veterans and their families -- building a movement to empower communities nationwide to take action to successfully reintegrate our nation's injured heroes—especially those who have sustained the *Hidden Injuries of War*—back into their communities so they may thrive physically, psychologically, socially, and economically.

<u>Income taxes:</u> BWF is exempt from the payment of income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and has been classified by the Internal Revenue Service, under an advance letter ruling, as a public charity within the meaning of Section 509(a)(1) of the Internal Revenue Code.

Financial Accounting Standards Board Staff Position FIN 48-3 (FSP FIN 48-3), *Effective Date of FASB Interpretation No. 48 for Certain Nonpublic Entities*, grants nonpublic organizations the option to defer the effective date of FASB Interpretation No. 48 (FIN 48), *Accounting for Uncertainty in Income Taxes* until the year ended December 31, 2009. As permitted by FSP FIN 48-3, BWF has elected to delay the implementation of FIN 48 until the year ended December 31, 2009. At that time, BWF will record a liability for income taxes when it believes that such an accrual is warranted based on current law or guidance from the appropriate taxing authorities.

<u>Basis of accounting:</u> The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting. Revenue, other than contributions, is recognized when earned and expense when the obligation is incurred.

<u>Use of estimates:</u> The preparation of financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Actual results could differ from estimates.

<u>Accounts receivable</u>: Accounts receivable primarily consists of ticket fees receivable relating to the Stand Up for Heroes special event. BWF's management periodically reviews the status of all accounts receivable balances for collectibility. Each receivable balance is assessed based on management's knowledge of the customer, BWF's relationship with the customer, and the age of the receivable balance. As a result of these reviews, balances deemed to be uncollectible are included in the allowance for doubtful accounts which amounted to \$1,950 at December 31, 2008.

Net assets: For financial statement purposes, net assets are as follows:

<u>Unrestricted net assets</u>: Unrestricted net assets include those net assets whose use has not been restricted by donors.

<u>Temporarily restricted net assets:</u> Temporarily restricted net assets include those net assets whose use by BWF has been donor-restricted for specified time or purpose limitations (see Note G).

A. ORGANIZATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES - CONTINUED

<u>Contributions</u>: Contributions are recognized when unconditionally promised to, or received by, BWF. Contributions are recorded as unrestricted, temporarily restricted, or permanently restricted support depending upon the existence and/or nature of any donor restrictions. Within temporarily restricted net assets, amounts are reclassified to unrestricted net assets when the time restriction expires or when the purpose restriction is satisfied.

<u>Program services:</u> Program services include the following activities, the descriptions for each of which follow.

<u>Charitable giving:</u> BWF invests in national and community-based programs that connect our troops to the help they need — from individual needs like physical accommodations, medical care and counseling, to larger social issues like homelessness and suicide.

<u>General programs:</u> BWF collaborates with other experts and organizations, at the federal, state, and local levels, to identify and solve issues related to the return of service members from combat to civilian life.

<u>Individual giving:</u> BWF provides discreet financial assistance to individual injured service members and their families.

<u>Public awareness and education:</u> Through a movement called ReMIND.org — BWF educates the public about 1) the needs of service members returning from war and 2) our nation's greater responsibility to ensure our heroes and their families receive the support necessary to successfully reintegrate into their communities.

<u>Supporting services</u>: Supporting services include the following activities, the descriptions for each of which follow:

<u>Management and general</u>: Management and general includes activities necessary for the administrative processes of BWF and managing the financial responsibilities of BWF.

<u>Fund raising:</u> Fund raising includes activities that encourage and secure financial support for BWF.

<u>Functional allocation of expense:</u> The costs of providing various program and supporting services activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the statement of activities. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the program and supporting services benefited.

B. CONCENTRATION OF CREDIT RISK

BWF maintains demand deposits with a commercial bank. At times, certain balances held within these accounts may not be fully guaranteed or insured by the U.S. federal government. The uninsured portion of cash accounts are backed solely by the assets of the underlying institution. Therefore, the failure of an underlying institution could result in financial loss to BWF.

C. INVESTMENT

Investment consists of a certificate of deposit which is recorded at cost plus accrued interest of \$16,722 and which approximates fair value. The fair value of the certificate of deposit amounted to \$1,033,414 at December 31, 2008.

D. PROMISE TO GIVE

BWF has received an unconditional promise to give a multi-year contribution from a donor which management has determined is fully collectible. The promise to give has been measured using the present value of future cash flows based on a discount rate of 3%.

E. FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

BWF has implemented Statement of Financial Accounting Standards No. 157 (FAS 157), Fair Value Measurements. FAS 157 defines fair value, establishes a framework for measuring fair value in accordance with generally accepted accounting principals (GAAP), and expands disclosures about fair value measurements. FAS 157 uses the following prioritized input levels to measure fair value. The input levels used for valuing investments are not necessarily an indication of risk.

<u>Level 1</u> – Observable inputs that reflect quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets such as stock quotes;

<u>Level 2</u> – Includes inputs other than level 1 that are directly or indirectly observable in the marketplace such as yield curves or other market data;

<u>Level 3</u> – Unobservable inputs which reflect the reporting entity's assessment of the assumptions that market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability, including assumptions about risk such as bid/ask spreads and liquidity discounts.

Fair value for the promises to give, included in level 3, is determined by calculating the present value of the future cash expected to be received, using discount rate of approximately 3% at December 31, 2008.

F. PROPERTY AND EQUIPMENT

Acquisitions of property and equipment greater than \$1,000 are recorded at cost and depreciated using the straight-line method over the following useful lives: website – 2 years; computer software – 3 years; and computer hardware – 5 years. G. In-KIND CONTRIBUTIONS

<u>Recorded amounts:</u> In-kind contributions include donated goods which are sold at auction, donated professional services, and donated facilities.

Donated goods are valued by a third party organization which specializes in charity auctions.

Donated services are recognized as contributions and expense in accordance with Statement of Financial Accounting Standards No. 116, *Accounting for Contributions Received and Contributions Made*, if the services (a) create or enhance non-financial assets or (b) require specialized skills, are performed by people with those skills, and would otherwise be purchased by the Organization.

Donated facilities are recorded based on the fair value of the space occupied.

G. In-KIND CONTRIBUTIONS - CONTINUED

<u>Unrecorded amounts:</u> BWF relies on contributions of both time and expertise from its pool of volunteers. In particular, volunteers work on BWF's programs and fund raising activities. BWF's volunteers donate hundreds of hours of service, the total value of which cannot be easily calculated or estimated, yet these volunteers contribute significantly to the work, impact, and success of BWF. These volunteer services have not been reflected in the accompanying financial statements because the volunteer services provided do not meet the criteria necessary for recognition.

H. TEMPORARILY RESTRICTED NET ASSETS

In general, temporarily restricted net assets are restricted for particular purposes by donors. However, temporarily restricted net assets include net assets with time restrictions which relate to the future expected receipts of the promise to give for which the donor has not stipulated a restriction as to purpose.

I. SPECIAL EVENT

BWF conducts a special event, *Stand Up For Heroes*, in which a portion of the gross proceeds paid represents both a contribution and a payment for the direct benefits received by the participant at the event. The fair value of meals and entertainment provided at the special event is measured at the actual cost to BWF. The direct costs of the special event, which ultimately benefit the donor rather than BWF, are recorded as program and fund raising expense. During the period from inception through December 31, 2008, BWF's special event revenue (relating only to the direct benefit to donors) and special event expense amounted \$52,534.

J. ALLOCATION OF JOINT COSTS

BWF conducted a special event that had both a program services component and an appeal for contributions. As a result, BWF incurred joint costs of \$159,963 during the period ended December 31, 2008. BWF's joint costs were allocated between program services and supporting services as follows for the period ended December 31, 2008:
